Concert. There would also be great difficulty about
Rehearsals, as the Choir could not arrive here until the
day of the Concert, on account of the members being all
they
business people residing and engaged in Bristol, and could
only run up to London for the afternoon as they did in the
case of Madame Albani's Concert. This, therefore, would
preclude the possibility of their assisting at more than
one Rehearsal, which would have to be on the day of the Concert
and also in regard to the Orchestra, it is usual for them to
have only one Rehearsal, any extra ones beyond that number
have to be paid for, which comes to a very heavy item
and would, I think, in the present case be impossible for
me to meet.

I think it only right to point out these difficulties to you, and as you see, I fear they are all insurmountable.

In place of Concert on the scale mentioned, would you be satisfied to give a Quartet Concert at St. James Hall, with the co-operation of Mr. Wolff and three other instrumentalists to be proposed to you, and who I think would meet with
